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In the Interim: From Rev. Terry Sweetser

We use a thematic approach for worship and Religious Education at First Church lifting up the precious gift of our community: Each month we explore a different aspect of building and fortifying this beloved community through its people and possibilities.

In April we ponder what it means to be a people of the wholeness. We ask ourselves what we dare and how we can trust each other, to live the lives we wish we could. Wholeness is about, and this is our message for the month, wholeness is about finding the cracks in life that illuminate what needs to be done for love.

What Does It Mean To Be A People of Wholeness?

Let's say that we're skeptical about rushing in to fix things.

We Unitarian Universalists understand the urge to restore what once was. It's human nature. Who doesn't want to reverse the damage? Who doesn't hold on to the Humpty Dumpty hope that all can be put back together again? But our faith teaches us that this is just not how the world works. Transition and change rule the flow of life. There is no going back. The current of time is just too strong.

And so the wholeness offered us is not that returning our lives to their original state but working with what remains to make something new. The shards are not pieces of a puzzle that needs put perfectly back together, but building blocks for molding into a yet to be imagined form. To be made whole again is to be reorganized, not restored.

Another way to put this is to say that there is freedom in the breaking. The cracks make room for creativity. That's not to minimize the pain. And it's certainly not a way of justifying tragedy as "part of God's plan." Rather, it's a call for us to perceive the broken pieces of our lives as more than just a pile of worthless and ruined rubble. "Look closer," says our faith, "that ash, if worked with, can give birth to a Phoenix."

So, what piles of rubble in your life need revisiting? What longing for what was needs let go so a new wholeness can emerge?

And how might you break open even further? Because that's part of this too, isn't it? "Your broken pieces are more than rubble" is not the only counterintuitive thing our faith tells us about wholeness. It also urges us to "Crack wider!"

As odd as it sounds, we were meant to be broken, broken open to be exact. Over and over again, our faith reminds us that protecting our wholeness is only half the game. The equally important part of life's journey is about letting in the wholeness of the world!

It's about cultivating cracks on purpose. It's about becoming exposed. As Leonard Cohen famously put it "Cracks are how the light gets in."

Broken hearts hurt but they also let in and allow us to connect with the pain of others. Protected hearts may seem safe, but our armor only ends up being a prison. It's one of the most critical but paradoxical spiritual truths there is: Broken people end up being more significant people.

So, in the end, maybe that's our most important "wholeness question": How are your cracks inviting you to become larger? What cracks do you need to cultivate on purpose?

Views from the Garden

Rumor has it that by the weekend, we will see temperatures approaching 60 degrees. I am too much of a New Englander to be unaware of the possibility of snow in April, but for the moment, I am optimistic. The snowdrops have popped, the crocuses are blooming on the berms, and the monochromatic planters on the steps of the Church call out for color and spring blooms. Easter is late this year, so we will have to be patient, but believe me, there is much work to be done in preparation. Below is a menu of tasks and commitments and garden committee activities. We invite you to participate in anything that strikes your fancy. No experience is necessary, and we can accommodate all levels of mobility.

1. Friday, April 12th, 9-12: Pre Easter clean-up

This session will entail a light clean-up throughout the yard. New growth is delicate and easily disturbed, so raking will have to be done very carefully.

2. Saturday, April 13th, 9-11: Clean-up rain date

We will finish any tasks not completed as well as (depending on the weather,) adorn the planters with palms) and arrange the interior displays. We are grateful for the generosity of the Truong family for providing funding for the palm fronds.

3. Saturday, April 20th, 9-12: Easter planters, interior arrangements and altar.

There will also be opportunities to give the grounds a last once-over prior to Easter.

As is our tradition we are again soliciting donations from the congregation for the Easter altar flowers (which you may take home after the service) as well as unrestricted funds for the planters throughout the Churchyard and interior displays (excluding the altar.) An order form is provided, or you may call Catherine at the Church office. We buy wholesale from Nunan's Landscaping and Nursery. Nunan's is definitely not the least expensive, but their plant material is excellent, and many of the plants are grown locally. Please consider buying your Easter flowers through us.

Lastly, I would like to thank Mark Stevens and Valentina Burbank for providing altar flowers in March. We are grateful for your generosity.

At the risk of overselling I will end by quoting Edgar Guest from his poem, *Plant a Garden*,

If it's drama that you sigh for,
plant a garden and get it
You will know the thrill of battle
fighting foes that will beset it
if you long for entertainment and
for pageantry most glowing,
Plant a garden and this summer spend
your time with green things growing.

From the Ministerial Search Committee (MSC)

Just imagine!

By the time you read this, the search committee will be talking with our final candidate about becoming the settled minister at First Church in Salem. We are very, very excited.

We had the opportunity to spend an entire weekend with this person, asking and answering questions; talking in depth about what was said in the congregational survey and the cottage chats, as well as what wasn't. We searched carefully for the qualities and skills you said you were looking for, and for those we discerned were important based on what we heard. We recognize that congregations and ministers grow together with one another, and we looked earnestly for someone who will grow well with us.



There was a great deal of interest in First Church amongst searching ministers, and we conducted many interviews. Listening to the various candidates, several repeating themes emerged, causing us to imagine possible next steps for this beloved community. They are ideas worth considering as we move into this next phase of First Church history.

Vision and Mission: Can we articulate why we come together in the form of a shared vision and mission? Can we use that agreed-upon vision and mission to inform and guide decisions of all kinds – from budgeting to social justice activities, from fellowship to social gatherings? How can we live out our deepest values?

Shared Ministry: Every candidate we interviewed talked about shared ministry. The strength of a church community derives not just from the minister; the congregation plays an essential role in ministering to one another and to the world. That kind of ministry can range from simple things like how we interact with and treat one another to bigger things like how we structure and implement pastoral care, religious education and social outreach. How can we at First Church minister to one another and the world? How can we best nurture lay leadership and inspire widespread participation in church life? How do we create a “shared ministry” that by its very nature is simultaneously nurturing and bold, loving and courageous?

A Culture of Abundance: What does it mean to live in a culture of abundance? To recognize and make decisions from an awareness of and gratitude for all that we have? Do we at First Church operate from a perception of scarcity -- that there's never enough of something? Not enough time, money, or love? And if so, how does that affect our thoughts and behavior in things both small and large, from interpersonal interactions to long-term decisions? What happens when one sees glorious opportunities and assumes they're possible rather than seeing the opportunities and assuming there are insurmountable obstacles (like a lack of time, money or love)?

What an exhilarating time to be part of First Church! So much food for thought! Far from feeling daunted by the questions raised in the search process, MSC members are eager to begin the next phase of our walk together with all of you.

As the search comes to a close, it's time to prepare for your part in calling our new minister. We urge you to make Candidate Week a priority and join us for as many events as possible. You will have two opportunities to see our final candidate lead worship and preach: **Sunday, April 28 and Sunday, May 5**. Please try to attend both. Other events will be organized throughout the week so that the candidate is able to meeting with staff, families and committees; we'll release the schedule for the week as soon as it is finalized; please be watching the Friday eHeralds and Sunday Orders of Service for those details.

Please note that our bylaws allow votes only from those present at the time of the election; proxy or absentee ballots will not be accepted. Also in accordance with our bylaws, voting members “appear on the records of the Treasurer to have made monetary contributions to the Society for the year which is concurrent with that of the relevant meeting of the Society.”

On May 5, 2019, immediately after the service, we will honor our nearly four centuries as the first American church ruled by congregational polity, and we will vote on whether to call our new minister. Just imagine!

In an effort to stretch their food budget, the Lifebridge Dinner Team is currently accepting ongoing donations of non-perishable food items. First Church prepares meals twice a month according to a fixed menu of baked ziti and salad, so the following specific items are requested:

- Ziti Pasta (any sized boxes)
- Plain tomato sauce, tomato puree, or crushed tomatoes (28 oz cans)
- Olive oil
- Minced garlic (small jars)
- Croutons (ideally vegan-friendly)
- Caesar salad dressing
- Vegan-friendly salad dressing (no dairy, cheese or anchovies; small bottles)
- Spices—Oregano, parsley flakes, dried basil
- Iced tea mix (size sufficient to make 2 gallons of beverage)

Each Sunday you may place the items in one of the well-marked blue plastic bins located outside the Barnard Room. PLEASE DO NOT BRING THESE ITEMS DIRECTLY TO THE LIFEBRIDGE SHELTER.
