Important Joint Announcement from the Trustees & the Standing Committee

From the Trustees

In these extraordinary times of a pandemic, and when daily challenges faced by so many individuals and institutions are not even remotely reflected in the strong performance of the stock market, the First Church Trustees have voted to make a one-time distribution of up to \$100,000 from the endowment to the Church for use as the Standing Committee and Reverend Ide believe best.

The year 2020 brought physical, emotional and financial hardship beyond what many people in our church and community at large had previously experienced. Each church ministry had to adapt, figuring out how best to serve one another and lean into our principles and covenant at this trying time. Pastoral care, social justice, worship, religious education, garden, archives --- all First Church ministries look different right now. Amid all of this, the Standing Committee must look to the future with an eye to what can be done now to help

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us navigate the current crisis while positioning us to emerge strong and prepared to live into our Unitarian Universalist faith.

The ministry of the First Church Trustees is to steward the Church's endowment so that it will support the church and its Unitarian Universalist principles for generations to come. Typically, we do this by: 1) setting an investment strategy for the endowment's funds in consultation with Cabot Wealth Management, and 2) determining a yearly income distribution policy that supplements member giving to the church's annual operating budget. By calibrating these, we can ensure that the endowment increases over time and thus continues to support the church into the future.

For the last several years, the financial markets have performed very well, generating returns far greater than those historically experienced. About a year ago, the 17-year rate of return was approximately 5.8%. Based on this, and the church's need at that time, we increased the endowment distribution rate from 4.5% to 5%, thus providing ongoing, increased support to the Church's annual operating budget.

Over the years, the Trustees also have occasionally voted to make a lump-sum distribution from the endowment to help the church with something extraordinary, such as helping to fund important construction projects.

As we see it, the needs of the current time are certainly extraordinary. At the same time, the value of our endowment has grown considerably due to a stock market that is seemingly impervious to the distress of so many people. Because of the endowment's strong performance, we have determined that lump-sum distribution of up to \$100,000 to the Standing Committee could help the Church navigate the current circumstances and/or prepare for next steps, while causing no harm what-soever to the endowment's capacity to support the Church's long-term sustainability.

Reverend Ide and Anthony Silva, Chair of the Standing Committee, will work with the Standing Committee to direct the process by which needs are identified and funded. We welcome your questions about the church's endowment at any time; our contact information is below.

From the Standing Committee

All of us on the Standing Committee are looking forward to when we can all safely return to the Meeting House as we continue our discussions on what that will eventually look like in the months ahead. This alone is something to celebrate. As we develop those plans, the decision by the Trustees has added a real incentive to address some longtime needs within the church that may be addressed now that the building has limited use. After speaking with numerous committee chairs, past presidents and other members, we are developing 'a plan to welcome the future' aimed at five goals:

- 1. Increased safety and accessibility for members and visitors
- 2. Improved technical quality for worship, weddings and other events
- 3. Moving forward with the First Church's Master Plan
- 4. Continuing the mission of First Church
- 5. Helping local families and the local economy

Specific improvements that may now be funded and carried out include electric system upgrades, improved public address system, improved WiFi and live streaming capability, improved pulpit accessibility, new wireless assisted hearing system, new carpeting and pew coverings, improved security system, improved signage. Many of these are long overdue. Much needed improvements in Wilson Hall and to the Church Organ should also be addressed. The Standing Committee has voted to support the spirit of this plan and prioritize these projects as well as earmarking 10% of the distribution to support charities aimed at acute community needs.

After last Sunday's Service, many of you took part is a Zoom discussion on this plan and you offered great support, encouragement and ideas on what should be accomplished. The Standing Committee will move forward with your help and assistance to make a real difference in the religious community we all love. Together, we remember that this 'plan to welcome the future' is made possible because of the sacrifice, commitment and largesse of our forebears. We carry on their belief that this work is important not only for us but for those who are yet to come.




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Ultimately Wintering invites us to change how we relate to our own fallow times.
